Soloman Alston, married Anne Hinton, daughter Col. John Hinton, who settled on the Neuse river, five miles from Raleigh. He was member of the Provisional Congress at Hillsboro in 1775. (See Walker's History of North Carolina.) In 1771 he commanded a detachment from Wake county under Gov. Tryon. In 1773 he was made Col. of Militia for Wake county and in 1775 Col. of the North Carolina militia. In 1776 he was a member of the Provincial Congress. He died in 1784. Had—

Charity Alston, born Jan. 19, 1743. Married Capt. James Jones. (Captain Jones was a member of the Provincial Congress of North Carolina in 1776, made Capt. of Third Company, First Regiment Light Horse Cavalry of North Carolina, April 22, 1776, and in 1777 served in the State Senate. He was the son of Shugan Jones, son of Edmund and Abigale Shugan, who was the first white woman to cross the Shocco river.) They had—

Rachael Jones, married Ralph Banks, in North Carolina, Thursday, Nov. 22, 1788.

ROGER BIGOD, the Surety, page 44, was Earl of Norfolk and Suffolk, and 15th in descent from SVIEDE THE VIKING (pedigree D, page 422). Born 1150 and died 1221, having married Isabelle, daughter of HAMELINE PLANTAGENET, page 204, son of GEOFFREY PLANTAGENET.

Son HUGH BIGOD was also a Surety and Earl of Norfolk and Suffolk, page 46. He married in 1212, MAUD, one of the sisters of WILLIAM MARSHALL, who was 16th in descent from SVEIDE THE VIKING (pedigree F, page 422).

Daughter ISOBEL BIGOD, page 49, whose second husband was John FitzGeoffrey, Sheriff of Yorkshire and Justice of Ireland, died 1258.

Daughter MAUD FITZJOHN FITZGEOFFREY, who married second William de Beauchamp, Baron of Eleuley and Earl of Warwick. He died 1298.

Daughter ISOBEL BEAUCHAMP married Patrick Chaworth, who died 1382, page 204.

Daughter MAUD CHAWORTH married HENRY PLANTAGENET, Earl of Lancaster.

Daughter LADY ELEANOR PLANTAGENET married Richard FitzAlan, "Copped Hat."

Son JOHN FITZALAN, born 1365, died 1391 married ELIZABETH DESPENCER, who was descended as follows:

RICHARD de CLARE, the Surety, page 58, was 4th Earl of Hertford, died 1217. His descent from SVIEDE THE VIKING is traced on page 421. His wife was Amicia Gloucester, and they were parents of GILBERT de CLARE, also a Surety, page 61, who was born 1180 and died 25 October 1230. His wife was Isabella, one of the sisters of William Marshall, the Surety, whose royal ancestor is recorded in pedigree F, page 422.

RICHARD de CLARE, page 66, married MAUD LACIE, daughter of JOHN de LACIE, the Surety, page 89, who was 15th in descent from ALFRED THE GREAT, and 28th in descent from CEDRIC, page 426. He married as his second wife Margaret Quincey, daughter of Robert and granddaughter of SAIRE de QUINCEY, the Surety.

Son GILBERT de CLAIR, page 69, Earl of Gloucester and Hertford, who died 1295, having married as his second wife JOAN OF ACRE, daughter of KING EDWARD I and his wife ELEANOR OF CASTILE, page 215.

Daughter ALLIANORE CLARE, page 70, married in 1337, her first husband HUGH DESPENCER, Earl of Gloucester, son of Hugh Despencer and his second wife Isobel Beauchamp, page 118.

Son EDWARD DESPENCER died 1342, married Anne, sister of Lord Ferrers of Groby, and daughter of William Ferrers and wife Margaret Seagrave, also of baronial descent.

Son EDWARD DESPENCER, K.G., baptized 24 March 1335/6 at Esseudine, died 11 Nov. 1375 at Llaublethian, County Glamorgan, was a warrior of renown. He married 2 August 1354 Elizabeth, daughter of Bertholomew Burghersh, K.G., also of baronial descent, and his wife Cecily, daughter of Richard de Weyland of Blaxhall and Cockfield, County Suffolk. Elizabeth died 26 July 1409, and was buried as was her husband, in Tewksbury Abbey, pages 70, 230.

He died at his palace at Shene which later became Richmond. So completely had the people forgotten his victory at Crecy, the golden spendthrift's death June 21, 1377, almost alone and unattended went almost unnoticed when Richard came to London to claim the throne. However, he is remembered as the Founder of the oldest extant order of chivalry, the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

As the story goes, a very beautiful lady lost a very necessary part of her attire, this a beautiful garter. The king found this silk bejewelled article and to prevent a scandal handed it to her saying out loud "Evil to him who evil thinks." This motto in Latin "Honi soit qui mal y pense" is the motto of the Knights of the Garter; possibly the only rival of the tales of King Arthur's Round Table.

Edward III was the victor of one of the most outstanding and decisive battles, namely Cricy 1346, that has been fought to date. The founding of this order of chivalry was in tribute in most part to the less prominent men who fought in this battle. The original members were forty in number, however this number was reduced to twenty-five and of that twenty-five the King and the Black Prince (Edward) were included. There were a large number of ladies of high rank at the ball, but who lost her garter intentionally or otherwise remains in doubt.

For fifty years Edward III reigned. At the age of forty-six was held on St. George's Day at Windsor a magnificent tournament in which he competed. That Christmas he had as his guests the kings of France and Scotland, who were held in captivity awaiting proposals of peace that would have awarded him all the southeast of France. On this occasion the yule log was dragged in as the three monarchs watched the revelry over their goblets of highly spiced cordial. At this time what did he think of the arrogant Mortimer and the relationship between Mortimer and his mother?

If his eyes were not open to this relationship, his were the only eyes that failed to know the truth. Mortimer later met a just fate - was hanged, his body drawn, quartered and disemboweled.

JOHN OF GAUNT 1340-1399

John of Ghent was born in the city of Ghent in the Low Countries. Common usage would corrupt his name to John of Gaunt. He was the third son of Edward III and his queen Phillippa. Phillippa was the daughter of the Count

of Hainault and Holland. Edward III and Phillipa were wed for forty-one years, and she had twelve children by Edward.

John was a very debatable character, hated by many of all classes, a fine knight in his way, tall, handsome and very ambitious. Had Edward lived longer, John might have become King of England, as John was his favorite. All of the first born of kings and queens in those days did not become rulers. Some were murdered or otherwise confined in a convenient castle, as was the case of Eleanor of Aquitaine, wife of Henry II who was allowed to spend Christmas holidays with Henry and his mistress, Fair Rosamonde.

John of Gaunt's first wife was Blanche of Lancaster, and from her he inherited great wealth and was the richest man in England. His second marriage was to Constance of Castile, but this marriage was not very happy. John had fallen in love with the accomplished and beautiful daughter of a knight of Hainault, Sir Payne de Roet. Katherine was the widow of Hugh Swinford and after the death of John's wife Katherine cared for John's children. She had fallen in love with John, and six children were born to them although they were not married. She was very careful to avoid any criticism of their behavior. They did marry after about twenty years, their children were legitimized with the help of the Pope and the consent of King Richard III, giving them the family name of Beaufort. The Beauforts took their name from Beaufort Castle in Anjou, France. Katherine was the mother of the first Beauforts from whom the Somerset Dukes of Beaufort were descended.

Edward III in his late years in his affair with Alice Perres was also the talk of the town. It's like the old saying "the pot calling the kettle black." John died three years after their marriage. He and his first wife are buried in a magnificent tomb in St. Paul's Cathedral in London. John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster died a natural death Feb. 3, 1389 in Leicester Castle with Katherine at his side.

After the death of John, Katherine returned to Lincolnshire where she died May 10, 1403. She is buried by the High Altar in Lincoln Cathedral where her son Harry Beaufort, later Cardinal and Chancellor had duly become Bishop. Her tomb is there now, with that of her daughter, Joan. The royal line of England eventually descended through John Beaufort (Earl of Somerset, Marquis of Dorset), who married Richard's half-niece. Katherine became the ancestress of Henry VII and the Tudor line, also the royal Stuart line of Scotland. Through Joan and Sir Ralph de Neville Earl of Westmoreland, Katherine was the great grandmother of Edward IV and Richard III. John of Gaunt and Katherine de Roet though not King or Queen were the ancestors of all the royal lines of Europe up to 1914 except the King of Spain.

John of Gaunt owned a number of castles, namely Kenilworth, Pontefract,

John was destined to play a part in history second only to the first son of
Edward III, Edward the Black Prince. This prince wore in battle black armor,
hence came his name.

Edward II was imprisoned in Corfe Castle and later removed to Berkley
Castle where he was murdered, afterward buried in the Abbey of St. Peters.
There is still another version of his escape from Berkley, his wanderings
through France and later retreat in a certain hermitage in the Castle of Melazzo
in Italy, then to the Castle of Cecima in Lombardy, Italy, where he lived a life
of penitence.

Now to mention just a few items to show the condition os the early times
of England. King Edward the Martyr was murdered in the Castle Gateway of
Corfe Castle 979. Hampton Court is haunted by the ghost of Katherine
Howard, executed 1542, fifth wife of Henry III.






