

GLEN DUNCAN CONFESSES THEFT OF AUTOMOBILES

Young Duncan participated in the theft of the Allaback car, which was taken from the garage at 11th and Spruce. In order to get this machine he broke a padlock on the garage door and one on the wheels of the auto. This car was driven to Cheyenne and return and was deserted by Duncan about four miles east of Boulder on the baseline road. The car was very badly damaged. His accomplice in this theft is enlisted in the U. S. navy and is now in California. The Wm. Crossley, the C. C. Saunders, Dr. O. M. Gilbert, L. W. Cumberland, E. C. Randall, Dr. A. R. Peebles and W. S. Withers cars were stolen by young Duncan and his friends. A Ford, the owner of which was never found out, was deserted by Duncan on Colfax avenue in Denver after a collision, in which the car was wrecked. In the theft of the Randail, Withers and Bohn cars he was assisted by his cousin, Lawrence Duncan, according to his confession. The latter was acquitted of implication in these crimes by a district court jury.

Suspicious that the car that his nephew was driving about was a stolen machine, Attorney Guy Duncan of this city requested the assistance of the Boulder officers in restoring the property to its rightful owner. The report of the car to the Denver police headquarters resulted in orders for the arrest of young Duncan. Attorney Duncan and the parents of the young boy have done everything they could to put the boy on the right track but to no avail. He is son of John T. Duncan, an honest man and tungsten miner and mill man.
