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Ben Sessel Finds Pawn Tickets For Loot Glenn Duncan "Soaked"

Ben Sessel returned from Nederland this afternoon, having collected the last link of the chain of the Glenn Duncan robberies. In other words he found some pawn tickets that Duncan left in the cabin on his father's place where he deposited the loot from the Meyer Bros' store, Mr. Reinert's and Prof. Hunter's residences. He also found the last article of clothing he had missed.

Deputy District Attorney Pomeroy intended to arraign Duncan today but postponed it until tomorrow morning. The young man's uncle, Guy D. Duncan, called on him in jail this morning and had a long chat with him. Whether he shall confess to this crime and take the reformatory route or fight and stand trial on the automobile theft charge, is said to depend on what his uncle advises.

Duncan pawned Reinert's thermos bottle for \$1 at a Denver shop. One bottle had been broken. He pawned a Reinert watch for \$5. Evidently he pawned an Eastman kodak belonging to Prof. Hunter. The Hunter's did not at first miss two kodaks and a half dozen of knives. The knives were in Duncan's plunder either at the shack

near Nederland or at Denver in his suit case.

The stolen suitcases, recovered, are as good as new. They were the best in the shop. Sessel says Duncan used rare judgment in selecting suits and shirts and things. In each instance he took the best in stock—a world of suits and haberdashery.

COSSACK CHIEF BOSS OF ALL RUSSIA NOW

Washington, Nov. 20.—Unofficial dispatches reaching here from the Swedish frontier say passengers arriving at Tornea from Russia declare that the situation is controlled by General Kaledines, the Cossack commander, who holds the country's grain supply. They say Petrograd is at his mercy.
